Active law enforcement executive with over 20 years experience. Currently serving in the rank of Deputy Chief and Executive Officer of the New York City Police Department's Organized Crime Control Bureau Narcotic Division.

PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATIONS

Management and Administration

Deputy Chief

Executive officer of the narcotics division, which covers the five boroughs of New York City, which represents over 10 million residents. Oversee the operations and administration for approximately 2400 supervisors, investigators, and civilians who are assigned to the narcotics division. Assume command and perform functions of the commanding officer during his or her absence. Coordinate operational activities of narcotics divisions Drug Enforcement Task Force (DEA/NYCPD/NYSP), Fire Arms Investigation Unit, Special Projects Unit, Canine Unit, and Training Unit. Liaison with federal and state law enforcement agencies, as well as law enforcement agencies outside of the United States and New York City. Authorize allocation of funds to pay for case buys and payments to confidential informants. Provide oversight and direction for all narcotics major cases. Administer selection and assignment of personnel to narcotics division. Review all administrative communications received at narcotics division. Represent the narcotics division at news worthy press conferences. Makes presentations at community forums. Perform functions as Duty Chief and supervise the citywide operations of the police department on selected dates. Based on initial findings during investigations of police misconduct determine if member will be arrested, suspended, placed on modified assignment, or other appropriate action if warranted. Monitor and implement cost control strategies to keep within the allocated budget for the division.

Precinct Commanding Officer

Supervised precincts with area populations of 150,000 to 170,000 residents. Acted as the senior problem-solving coordinator for the command. Identified major crime and quality of life conditions affecting the command. Performed analyses of the identified crime and "quality of life" problems in order to separate them into their essential components and then, design a response. Implemented and evaluated the effectiveness of personnel

responses to crime and “quality of life concerns.” Investigated reports of police misconduct and determined appropriate criminal or administrative solutions. Oversaw the investigation of communications, and preparation and forwarding of reports. Acted as Shooting Team Captain coordinating investigation of police firearms discharges. Acted as Duty Captain supervising all patrol operations in a borough when designated. Maintained high ethical standards and integrity for all members of the command. Motivated command personnel to adopt a proactive, not-reactive style of policing. Fostered a positive respectful relationship between command personnel and various community members, community organizations, the clergy, political representatives, and existing merchant associations. Conducted frequent town hall style meetings with members of the community to report on the progress of precinct strategies to reduce crime and “quality of life conditions.”

Investigations

Narcotics Lieutenant

Supervised “turf based” narcotics enforcement within a designated precinct area. Gathered and analyzed data from all available sources to identify areas of narcotics trafficking. Identified narcotics gangs and devised tactical enforcement action to dismantle organizations. Oversaw the use of technical resources, pen registers, and wiretaps. Personally controlled investigators' utilization of confidential informants. Administered modules operational and investigative budgets. Directly supervised prisoner processing and case management for future court presentations. Conducted major case narcotics investigations, which identified mid- to high-level narcotics organizations and supervised investigative activities to dismantle such organizations. Worked directly with federal and state law enforcement agencies. Attended precinct community meetings to report on narcotics enforcement activities and to gather information from community members on narcotic's conditions.

Internal Affairs Lieutenant

Investigated allegations of uniformed members of the service and civilian members of the service who were engaged in criminal activity or serious misconduct. Conducted surveillance of alleged subjects, interviews with witnesses or complainants, and interrogations of subject members when necessary and devised scenarios to test the integrity of subject members. Maintained case management and determined action against member under investigation.

Executive Officer

Assumed command and performed functions of commanding officer during absence. Supervised performance of administrative function command and coordinated all precinct specialized units.

Special Operations Lieutenant

Supervised and coordinated commands' specialized personnel including school safety sergeant, anti-crime teams, street narcotics enforcement unit, community policing unit, warrant officers, crime prevention, traffic safety officer, youth office, auxiliary police coordinator, and peddler enforcement personnel. Attended community council, community board, and similar meetings at the direction of the commanding officer. Responsible for the field-training program of probationary police officers assigned to the precinct community-policing unit.
